## **Sanctuary Advisory Council Meeting**

Friday, September 17, 2021 9:00 am - 12:30 pm Online Webinar Session

### **Final Key Meeting Outcomes**

#### Administrative Business and Announcements

California Sea Grant Fellow June Shrestha oriented advisory council members and attendees with introductions regarding sign-in, audio/video set-up, and the protocol for how to participate effectively in the virtual meeting. Sanctuary deputy superintendent Mike Murray confirmed online attendance, counting the presence of 23 council members representing 16 out of 21 voting seats (Appendix 1). In addition to council members, 21 members of the public attended the webinar, as well as 13 sanctuary staff and interns.

## July 16, 2021 Draft Key Outcomes

The council approved the draft key outcomes from the July 16, 2021 advisory council meeting. Ben Pitterle offered a motion to adopt the notes, which was seconded by Stuart Kasdin. Chair Phyllis Grifman led a voice vote. There were no oppositions or abstentions to the vote. #### Council Member Brief Announcements

Council members shared a variety of announcements about recent events from their respective agencies and groups. Written announcements submitted via a Google Form in advance of the meeting are available (Appendix 2).

#### Sanctuary Superintendent's Report

Sanctuary superintendent Chris Mobley began by discussing COVID-19 conditions, outlook, and challenges and Fiscal Year 2022 budget possibilities, priorities, and expectations. Mobley shared a brief update on the sanctuary management plan revision process, which only needs review by the ONMS Director before the draft can be released for public comment soon. He recognized how valuable advisory council discussions and input up to this point have been, including recent feedback from the council's Climate Change Subcommittee and Marine Debris Subcommittee. Mobley then announced changes to the contracted vessel crew at CINMS, welcoming Captain Matt Howard whilst saying goodbye to longtime captain Marshall Stein.

Superintendent Mobley provided a few research highlights, including the publication of a new journal article co-authored by sanctuary resource protection staff. Lastly, he shared resources online pertaining to recent CINMS activities, including: 1) the *Get Into Your Sanctuary* webinar; 2) a TEDx Santa Barbara talk on the Protecting Blue Whales and Blue Skies program; 3) a webinar featuring conversations with indigenous leaders; and 4) a new webstory acknowledging several volunteer programs within the national marine sanctuary system.

#### Guest Presentations on Resource Protection Issues

# A. U.S. Coast Guard Pacific Coast Port Access Route Study (LTJG Nicholas Buch, U.S. Coast Guard)

LTJG Buch presented on the recently commenced Pacific Coast Port Access Route Study (PAC-PARS) by Coast Guard Districts Eleven (D11) and Thirteen (D13). The intent of the study is to analyze current and future demands of waterway usage to ensure safe navigation within all major routes adjacent to and within port entrances and traffic separation schemes for the entire U.S. Pacific Coast. Major goals of the study include: 1) analyzing and quantifying historical vessel traffic densities, 2) analyzing and quantifying historical marine incidents/casualties, 3) collecting and analyzing public comment and concern, 4) working with maritime and environmental partners to determine future waterway use, and 5) making an informed recommendation to maintain, amend, or create vessel routing measures.

# B. Gray Whale Unusual Mortality Event (Justin Viezbicke, NOAA Fisheries West Coast Region, Office of Protected Resources)

Mr. Viezbicke presented updates on the recent Gray Whale Unusual Mortality Event, which started in January 2019 to 2021. From Mexico to Alaska, nearly 500 Gray Whales were reported stranded. Various factors have contributed to this Unusual Mortality Event, including malnutrition, human interactions, predation by Killer Whales, and disease. Mr. Viezbicke highlighted challenges in the response and investigation of Gray Whale Unusual Mortality Events, and concluded by fielding questions from council members.

# C. Island Shoreline Cleanups (Amber McEldowney, National Marine Sanctuary Foundation)

Ms. Amber McEldowney presented results from two 2021 Santa Cruz Island cleanups. These cleanups, supported by the National Marine Sanctuary Foundation, connect NOAA

with local businesses, nonprofit organizations, and fishermen to clean up debris from rocky shorelines off of Santa Cruz Island. Over the course of two cleanup days, 48 participants collected 4,000 lbs of debris from 2.5 miles of shoreline. About 70 lobster traps and buoys were collected, many of which were very degraded and did not have tags, suggesting that they were lost before 2017 when California Department of Fish and Wildlife implemented a lobster tagging program. Numerous council members asked questions about the types of marine debris found, lobster trap tagging design, partner cleanup projects, and ways to get involved.

#### **Public Comment**

During the 15-minute designated period, Jeff Maassen provided a comment on the Port Access Route Study, suggesting that NOAA collate information about noise with the study. Maassen also commented about the extent of marine debris on the Southeast shore of San Clemente Island, and asked if volunteers could help clean up debris there. In response, Greg Sanders (Department of Defense seat) commented that volunteers cannot go to that island but there are military personnel enthusiastic about clean ups, and there are plans to study marine debris and clean it up this fall.

#### Council Administration

#### A. Council Consideration and Adoption of Meeting Dates for 2022

Council members expressed support for the proposed meeting dates in 2022: January 21, March 18, May 20, July 15, September 16, and November 18. Deputy Superintendent for Programs Mike Murray expressed hope that the council can get back to in-person meetings when possible in 2022, pending permissions from NOAA.

#### B. Upcoming Officer Elections and Seat Recruitment Schedule

Murray explained officer positions, eligibility, the nomination process, and election process for the upcoming officer elections to be held in November 2021.

## C. Active Working Groups and Subcommittee Membership & Meetings

Murray explained the purpose and structure of working groups and subcommittees, and then turned to each group chair for their brief remarks on the purpose of the group and membership. The Research Activities Panel, Sanctuary Education Team, Chumash Community Working Group, Conservation Working Group, Climate Change Subcommittee, and Marine Debris Subcommittee each presented. The council also heard about the status of the Recreational Fishing Working Group, with Murray acknowledging that the group has been "active" regardless of not holding public working group meetings.

## D. Future Council Meetings - Prioritization Process for 2022

Murray explained that the council will have a process to prioritize SAC agenda items, which will involve council ratings of issues/topics to help CINMS staff allocate agenda time toward items that are of high interest. Murray indicated that more information on the prioritization process will be presented at a future Sanctuary Advisory Council meeting.

Mobil Trucking for Santa Ynez Unit Phased Restart project on September 29th

#### **Narrative**

The Santa Barbara County Planning Commission will consider the Exxon Mobil Trucking for Santa Ynez Unit Phased Restart project on September 29<sup>th</sup>. ExxonMobil ("Applicant") is proposing a phased approach to restarting oil production at its existing Santa Ynez Unit (SYU) facilities, consisting of offshore platforms Hondo, Harmony, and Heritage, and an onshore processing facility at the LFC, by:

- 1) Constructing a tanker truck loading rack and ancillary equipment within the LFC; and
- 2) Initiating interim trucking of limited crude oil production (approximately 11,200 barrels/day) from the LFC to two receiving terminals until pipeline transport becomes available.

As proposed, the project would allow for the transport of SYU processed oil via tanker truck from the LFC to the following two receiving sites along predetermined routes: (1) the Phillips 66 SMPS, located near the City of Santa Maria in northern Santa Barbara County; and (2) the Plains Pentland Terminal, located near the City of Maricopa in southwestern Kern County. Trucking would occur seven days per week, 24-hours per day, with no more than 70 trucks leaving the LFC within a 24-hour period to the SMPS, and no more than 68 trucks leaving the LFC within a 24-hour period to the Pentland Terminal. The lifetime of the interim trucking project is expected to be four to seven years, and would not exceed seven years unless extended by County decision-makers.

The hearing will be held in a virtual format and allow for public comment for those who would like to do so. The staff report and EIR, as well as the agenda for that day may be viewed on the Planning & Development Departmental website here:

#### **Narrative**

Lisa Uttal and Hollings intern Celia Patterson produced a webinar on recreational fishing for 2021 MBNMS GIYS, which showcased a prerecorded video and live interactions with guest speakers, which included MBNMS Advisory Council members for recreational fishing Jose Montes and Adam Helm.

The webinar shared a video recording of interviews of Jose, Adam and Vince Schweitzer on the water. The interview questions highlighted the opportunities for recreational fishing in the sanctuary, and the amazing biodiversity and productivity of the sanctuary. The pre-recorded interview also touched upon the sanctuary being a type of MPA, and the differences between the sanctuary and the network of state MPAs, with the sanctuary being the type of MPA that promotes sustainable fishing practices. During the live Q/A of the webinar, the guest speakers shared live stories about the sanctuary, and they were able to speak about responsible recreational fishing - getting a license, knowing your species and ocean conditions before going

out and how you can be a steward for the sanctuary by picking up trash and not getting too close to marine mammals. The guest speakers really communicated their passion for fishing during the Q&A. There were 68 participants in the webinar and over 135 registrants.

# Narrative

The 2021-2022 California spiny lobster season is scheduled to begin on October 2<sup>nd</sup> for the sport fishery and October 6<sup>th</sup> for the commercial fishery. The average price per pound for the commercial fishery reached a record price of \$38.10 last season, with a record number of report cards (~46,000) sold for the sport fishery. In the early weeks of the 2020-2021 lobster season, landings from blocks around the Channel Islands National Marine Sanctuary (CINMS) comprised about 20% of overall landings. Since the 2015-2016 season, the commercial landings from Santa Barbara and Ventura counties have made up 50% or more of statewide landings.
